Learning activities and highlights




colour and joy to our shared spaces.

Useful tips that could make a real difference in an emergency situation

Register Your Mobile for Emergency Texts

You can register your mobile phone to contact emergency services via text message. Text "register" to 999. You'll receive a reply respond with "yes" to complete registration. Once registered, if you're ever unable to speak during an emergency, you can text 999 with a brief description on the emergency your GPS location will be picked up and will be shared with emergency services.

Silent Emergency Calls (Mobile Only)

If you call 999 and cannot speak or answer questions. Press 55 or tap the screen when prompted. Your call will be transferred to the police, who can usually locate you. If you don't press 55 or respond, your call may be ended.

Quick Emergency Access via Lock Button

On many mobile phones, pressing the lock button 5 times quickly will automatically call emergency services. This is a useful shortcut if you need help but can't unlock your phone or dial manually.
